Greetings, grace, and peace to you from our Triune God whom we name as the Father, Son, and the Holy Spirit.

Amen+

For those whom I haven't met or had the chance to meet, I am Pastor Joshua Krenz, your new pastor. All bright and shiny like pastor. I am originally from Santa Fe, New Mexico, where I was born and raised, spent most of my days, in school is where I spend most of my days; chillin' out, maxin', relaxin' all cool (*Fresh Prince of Bel-Air* Lyrics, Will Smith, edited). But it's all true. I moved to Colorado in 2000 with my parents, went to college in Colorado at Western State College of Colorado and graduated 2010 with a degree in Mathematics. I returned to Santa Fe to begin my post-college life without a certain plan and tried to find something to do that I could have some earning. I began trying to sell life insurance for a month, realized that was not the path for me, became a server at an Olive Garden, then a Utility Line Locate Technician (those who paint up the streets for buried utility lines) and a Dish Network technician.

It was while working for Dish that I heard my call into the ministry. I was sitting in the evening Good Friday service back in 2015 when a voice or inner thought said to become a pastor. I couldn't believe what this voice was telling me so I ignored it. Except between customers for Dish, this same voice kept saying to become a pastor. For four months I ignored and let this voice keep going and for four months it would persist. I finally had to talk with the pastor at my home congregation and with guidance said this was a calling from God. That night, I told my parents and they knew I would be a pastor at the age of six. I decided to leave my job at Dish to focus on this calling, worked as a security officer in the meantime, and pursued this call.

I began seminary education at Trinity Lutheran Seminary in Columbus, Ohio, after the home congregation pastor suggested to check it out before making my ultimate choice. I fell in love with the seminary and was blessed to begin in the summer of 2017 with three intensive weeks of Konia Greek. The seminary education then moved to Trinity Lutheran Church in Lehighton, Pennsylvania, where I did my internship for two years. (The Master of Divinity program consists of two years on campus learning then two years of internship learning.) While I was blessed to have a nice congregation, the COVID pandemic limited my interactions with the congregants then as it continues to do now. I was fortunate, though, to be part of the Food Pantry and Thrift Store of Trinity Lutheran Church which solidified my understanding of helping our neighbor. I graduated from Trinity Lutheran Seminary in May 2021 giving me time to decompress, have interactions with the public through service at a restaurant before being called to Good Shepherd Lutheran Church here in Conneaut.

Ok, so, that's pretty much the biography you might have been given about me before arriving and before the congregational vote in late November. But who really am I, what really is your pastor, like, who is this guy who is fresh from the seminary and how can he meet my pastoral needs? I bring up the questions because, while I have the necessary training and the internship experience, being <u>your</u> pastor is going to take interactions with <u>you</u>. As Bishop Laura Barbins of the Northeast Ohio Synod (our bishop) likes to say, "Stupid COVID"; it is the stupid COVID that hasn't given us the possibilities to meet in person for cottage meetings or for fellowship/cottage meeting at the church. It's this stupid COVID that has kept many of the familiar faces home and only connecting to us through the YouTube video, the occasional phone call, or through prayer. It's this stupid COVID that has prevented and continues to prevent me from doing what I, as a minister and your pastor, am called to do – to visit you, offer pastoral care, get to know you. Yes, part of my calling is to lead worship on Sundays, to administer the sacrament of Holy Communion and preach the word, but a call into ministry is more than that; it's to be a pastor, to serve you, to shepherd you, to be with and among you. That is my calling and that is what I want to do.

So, here is my invitation to you. I will meet you where you are, in your home, in the coffee shop, at church, I will meet you where you are to get to know you, you the person. I don't want to push anyone, anyone, into a situation they are not comfortable with. If staying home works for you, I'd be happy to meet you at home. If going to a park – though not with 3 feet of snow on the ground – I will go to the park. If a solo trip to the church, I am there almost every day. I will meet you where you are and we can get to know each other and what needs/desires/expectations from me as <u>your</u> pastor are on your mind. I'm here and much rather talk in person than over the phone or over Zoom (or whatever).

My door is always open both figuratively and literally (when I'm at the church). I don't have set office hours yet, but I tend to get to the church around 9:00 to 10:00am and leave around 5:00 to 6:00pm Monday through Thursday, and on Sunday get to the church around 8:00am and leave around 2:00pm. Friday is my current day off and Saturday I'm available just don't come to the office – usually. I encourage you to call the church and set something up or just drop by for a chat and some good pastoral care – which can include coffee or other hot beverage.

I look forward to meeting all of you very soon and until then:

A Moment in Faith By Richard Tulino, a Layman's Interpretation



Some people have something special, something that commands respect! They light up a room, people notice them, people gravitate to them, people want be in their company. Sometimes these special people are good looking, but sometimes not. Sometimes they are full of life, electric, but sometimes not. Sometimes they are intellectually brilliant, but sometimes not. There are times when we find it difficult to put our finger on the elusive something that makes these people special and the best we can say is that we will know what it is when we see it. It is just a fact that some people have a special gift, something special that commands respect, that draws people, that inspires trust. We all may know someone like that, not many, because in a lifetime we meet only a few.

We see that kind of thing in the Gospel of Matthew 4:12-23. As Jesus walks by the Sea of Galilee, He sees two brothers, Simon Peter and Andrew, castings their nets into the sea. Jesus says to them, "Come after me, I will make you fishers for men." Immediately they leave their nets to follow Jesus. Immediately! Matthew tells us! Then Jesus sees two more brothers, James and John, also fishermen, mending their nets. They were with their father Zebedee, and Jesus calls to them to follow and immediately they leave their father and follow Jesus.

Notice what Jesus says in His call to these four men. Note the appeal He makes: Jesus does not say, "Follow me, I will save your souls." Jesus does not say, "Follow me, and I will make you rich." Jesus does not say, "Follow me, and I will make you popular." What Jesus says is, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." In other words, Jesus does not tell these men what they can <u>get</u>, but what they can <u>give</u>. Like these four men, Jesus appeals to the part of us that wants to do something worthwhile, that seeks meaning in our lives, that is willing to sacrifice in the service of something important. So Jesus says to these disciple-candidates, "Follow me, and I will help you help others," and they follow <u>immediately</u>! They leave everything familiar to follow Jesus.

Wouldn't it have been great to have been there to see Jesus in the flesh? To have an opportunity to sit at Jesus' feet and to have experienced whatever it was that drew people to Jesus, which commands their respect, which inspired their trust! But we have seen Jesus through the eyes of faith. We've had the opportunity to sit at His feet and learn from Him. We have experienced something in Jesus that draws us to Him, that commands our respect and inspires our trust. We are not alone, all over the world in places Jesus never set foot, people are following Him, worshiping Him, learning from Him and loving Him all through the eyes of faith.

All our life, we have been looking for someone we could really trust. Jesus is the one. He loves us all. He calls us all to love others in His name. If we will follow Him, He will make something wonderful of all our lives. Love Him, serve Him, and see what He can do for you!

The Big Churchy Word this month is:

"Service"

Service (Lat. *Servire,* "to serve") Biblically, service is the work usually done by slaves. In the Christian context, the work of slaves for masters is now offered on behalf of Christ to others (Gal. 5:13; 1 Cor. 9:19; 2 Cor. 4:5).¹

Now we have the theological dictionary definition of service, but what does it mean? To do work for others? To do work for ourselves? To be a slave? I encourage you to think about this a moment before moving on with how I see service.

3...2...1...

Yes is the answer – a motto from the company of restaurants I worked for in Columbus but I still like it. Yes is the answer. Yes, service is to do work for others. Yes, service is to do work for ourselves. Yes, service is to be a slave. But here is where it gets difficult. Service is to be a slave to other people and the needs of other people. Service is to be a slave to Christ, doing the work of Christ, not for our own salvation (another word we'll talk about later) but for the earthly saving of others. Service gives you that warm, cozy, fireplace feeling when you have helped another human being regardless of beliefs. That's what we strive for, that's what we are slaves for: slaves to others because we are commanded to help and love others; slaves to ourselves to get that warm and cozy feeling by helping others; slaves to Christ for all Christ did for us – granting us an overwhelming abundance of grace.

So, let us get warm with each other by serving each other. Let us get warm by serving our community. Let us get warm by serving Christ in this world.






Order Your Nisua

The Quilting Girls enjoyed a nice lunch at Castaways prior to our Christmas break.


We gave 10 quilts to our Christmas families.


