From the thoughts of the pastor . . .

Grace and peace to you from Our Risen Savior, Christ Jesus.

Christ is risen, alleluia. He is risen indeed, alleluia.

It's spring time here in Conneaut. The weather is warming, rain comes almost every afternoon, and the flowers are beginning to bloom. It is definitely a very nice change of pace from the cold and snow of the past winter. The one thing I get asked a lot, with good reason, is where I am from. The Krenz family is not Finnish and didn't grow up or live in Conneaut so the question comes. And people are surprised that I say I'm from Santa Fe, New Mexico. Then the next question always is, "so how do you like it up here" and "why would you move to Conneaut from Santa Fe?" To be completely honest, one reason I like it here is the weather, the snow, the rain, and the days that are sunny – it helps appreciate the sun more.

And there it is, right there, it helps appreciate the SON more. (Yes, I did just do a play on words.) We are in the season of Easter. Yes, just like Christmas, Easter is a season not a day. But we are in the season of Easter to celebrate the new life that has come into the world. At Christmas, we celebrated the new life in the form of a baby. Easter we celebrate the new life of the defeat of death. But what do us theologians and people of faith mean by defeating death? People still die, our loved ones still die on a daily basis from all sorts of causes, so what are we saying when celebrating defeating death?

In order to answer that, we need to think of our lives as two different lives: our earthly life and our spiritual life. Our earthly life is what we have now – our age, our bodies, our homes, our possessions, and our family, everything we have on earth. Our spiritual life, though, is a bit more complex. We can't exactly put a finger on a description of the spiritual life because everything we use to describe a spiritual life is of the earthly world. Some might say the spiritual life is our soul or perhaps our conscience – these are only synonyms for the spiritual life, an easier way to say the same thing. We also don't know what a spiritual life, a soul, or a conscience is because there hasn't been anything or anyone that can explain it without using earthly words. But I think we can agree and say that we have two different lives and as such, each life is nurtured and fed differently. Let's start with the earthly life.

Our earthly existence continues through the eating of food and drinking of drink to break down the sugars in the food and drink to run all the functions of the body and cell reproduction. And in order for our bodies to work the best at functioning and cell reproducing, the less impact from outside influences, the less sugars converted to energy are needed, hence the need for shelter. The need for water and drink comes from the fact our cells and our bodies are mostly liquid that gets used up functioning and cell reproducing all the time. Thus, without food, shelter, and water our earthly bodies would begin to stop functioning and our cell reproduction would end. I believe a doctor might agree that death here is the ceasing of cell reproduction.

We have many things, activities, locations, etc. to keep our earthly bodies functioning and cell reproducing. Many restaurants, grocery stores, other places for food and drink, many homes for shelter, and doctors and medical equipment to help the body continue to function and cell reproduction. However, even with all our

restaurants, grocery stores, homes, and medical equipment, bodies still cease functioning and cease cell reproduction, people still die. This is what we bury in our cemeteries, in our back yards, or have on the mantle: the collection of ceasing bodily functions and ceasing cells, no longer reproducing.

Our spiritual existence, however, continues a little bit differently. Our spiritual life still needs food and drink and shelter but slightly different kinds of food, drink, and shelter. But there is no cell reproduction as we think of it in the spiritual life but certainly there is a functioning. We begin with the shelter because the shelter is our earthly bodies. We, as an earthly body, shelter the spiritual life, we earthly creatures house the spiritual life; we are vessels for the spiritual life. Sounds a bit like Men in Black aliens but that analogy does kind of work. Next, we come to drink which I'm going to lump with food for the spiritual life. Our spiritual lives need to be fed with some kind of nutrition and that can be reading a good book, watching a good movie, and/or doing an enjoyable activity. However, those are like having candy or a power bar rather than a meal; good for you and keeps your spiritual life going but not a full meal. A full meal for your spiritual life is a religious practice and having a devotional practice. One can absolutely live on candy or power bars but not as long as having a full healthy meal.

And healthy is the next key word. Just like fast food restaurants and other potentially unhealthy earthly food and drink in this world, there are unhealthy spiritual restaurants – we tend to call these places cults. (Come to confirmation class next year to learn the difference between cult and sects.) Cults are unhealthy ways to feed your spiritual life. They might keep you going, but they will cause severe issues later in life. Healthy restaurants, though, are the churches, synagogues, and mosques where a healthy, fully nutritious, meal is offered and consumed. Now, we might not all agree that all churches, synagogues, and mosques offer healthy spiritual food; even I have my issues with some. But they work for some and not for others, like earthly food restaurants.

Therefore, going back to the season of Easter, celebrating the Resurrection of Our Lord and the new life that he brings, we go back to the question what do we mean when we say Christ defeated death? Christ defeated the death experienced by the spiritual life – our spiritual life will never die*. Our spiritual life will be placed into new shelters at the last day. So, we celebrate the fact that we will never really die. Our bodies and earthly existence (our function and cell reproduction) might come to an end, but our spiritual life will live forever*.

Yes, there is an asterisk (*) but that seems like a very small price to pay for the possibility of eternal spiritual life. This is what Christ gives us this season and this is certainly something to celebrate.

Christ (and our spiritual life) is risen, alleluia. He (and our spiritual life) is risen indeed, alleluia.

A Moment in Faith By Richard Tulino, a Layman's Interpretation



We have all been on journeys in our life and have reached many destinations. I'd like to ask you this question: What is more important, the journey or the destination? It is important to value each day, each opportunity that comes to us, to live in the moment and not wish one's life away. But I will have to say that I remember when every time I reached a destination with my little kids in the car, I was very, very glad and that reminded me that as Christians our destination is very important. The journey yes, but the destination is most important.

As Christians we can say that our life's goal, our main journey, is eternal life, the full and abundant life promised to us by Jesus, but we also need to make it through each day and each week. In the Lord's Prayer we ask for our daily bread—enough for each day. It is like the manna that came to the Hebrews each day, enough for that day but could not be stored up (except for the Sabbath). It is enough to be faithful day by day and let the long range take care of itself. It is enough to worry about the troubles of each day and let the past go and the future take care of itself. If the destination is sure then each day the journey is enough to be concerned about.

In 1 John 3:2, John says, "Now we are children of God, and it is not yet revealed what we will be. But we know that, when he is revealed, we will be like him; for we will see him just as he is." We will see God, we will be like Christ. We will have the bread of life and never be hungry; the living water and never be thirsty. We will look back and wonder why we worried so much, why we trusted so little, why we were so concerned with material things when what really mattered was other people, our family, our friends, the people God put in our lives. We will look back and wonder why we did not enjoy the journey more and understand that the goal, or destination, was life with God.

We may think we are on the right way to our destination, but we may not be. We may tell ourselves to live each day as it comes, but still get hijacked by worries and cares and regrets and remorse. We may think we are valuing other people but instead we may be so preoccupied with ourselves that we do not find time for them. We may talk about loving people and liking things but too often it is the other way around, we love our things sometimes more than people. We may be so busy that we forget about God. We may even come together and sing a hymn and say a prayer and yet live each day as if God did not really matter. We may be working so hard for the food that perishes that we forget about the food that endures to eternal life.

So, is it the journey or the destination? Yes, each day is important. We have been richly blessed and have been blessed to be a blessing. Give thanks for the people in your lives, the blessings you have each day. Give thanks for your daily bread. But rejoice and be glad for the destination is so important, too. You have been given a goal, a finish line, and a destination to be with God and like God. You are God's child now and you will see God face to face. You have been promised eternal life. You are redeemed, so savor and enjoy your journey, too!

"Church"

Church (Gr. *Kyriakon*, "thing belonging to the Lord"; Lat. *Ecclesia*, Fr. *É*glise, derived from Gr. *Ekklēesia*, "assembly") The community of those who profess faith in Jesus Christ. In the NT it is used in a limited sense for local communities and in a universal sense for all believers.¹

It is interesting that we often say "go to church" or "come to church" but really we use the word "church" incorrectly. I think one of the big memes that circled during the shutdowns, at least in my Facebook world, was the picture of church being anywhere. We like to think that the church is the building or the property, but actually it's us, the community. Another Greek word that we can use is *koinonia* which means community. Good Shepherd is more than a building, it is a *koinonia* and an *ekklēesia*; it's a church.

So, we ask ourselves, if the building fell down, if the building closed, if the building no longer existed, would Good Shepherd exist. The answer is yes, it would. Because Good Shepherd is the people, not the sanctuary, or the fellowship hall, or the offices and classrooms. It's not the food pantry, it's not the AC units, or the flooring, Good Shepherd is the people. It's the people who volunteer in the food pantry, who volunteer maintaining the building, who volunteer making the quilts for people. It's the people who volunteer their time out of their busy schedules away from their loved ones to attend meetings. It's the people who come to worship in all different ways.

So, if the church definition is so broad, why do we try to limit who worships and how they worship? I know I've mentioned to some people, and probably have mentioned in my sermons, that worship doesn't have to be perfect, that there is no wrong way to worship. Jesus says when two or more are gathered in my name I am there.² It doesn't say when two or more are gathered with the right hymns or the right order or the perfect execution of the service do I show up. Only, when two or more are gathered.

We gather together to have church six if not the full seven days a week. We gather to have our meetings to do the earthly business of the assembly, we gather at the exercise classes. We gather to worship together on Sunday mornings and we gather to sew quilts and eat donuts and have coffee. It is all church because we do it all together, with each other, in the name of Jesus. Certainly, Jesus comes when we gather together to do church. And if the building fell down or the property was no longer able to work for us, we'd still have church because we'd still have each other. That is the meaning of church.

A Message from the President

Highlights of April 19th Council Meeting:

Treasurer's Report

The balance in the General Fund as of March 31st was \$33,466. Here are the monthly and year-to-date offering income and expense numbers. As you can see, the amounts have varied widely in the first three months. The March offering income was the lowest of the year but the expenses were the highest of the year. Part of the reason for the high expenses was because it took much more natural gas and electricity to heat our building in the cold days of February and March. It is the responsibility of each and every one of us to keep the outside doors closed and lights turned out when not necessary. The good news is that we have not had to tap into our 'Reserve Account' or the income from our rental properties to support our ministry.

Based upon our 2022 budget, our average monthly offering income should be \$15,885. In the first three months we have averaged \$14,353.

Facial Mask Policy

Ever since the onset of the COVID pandemic, church council has based our facial mask policy on the recommendations from the Center for Disease Control (CDC) and the rate of infection and hospitalization in Ashtabula County. Currently, Ashtabula County, and all of Ohio, are ranked in the low risk "green zone." Accordingly, at its April 19th meeting, the church council has modified its mask policy for attending church functions from "Mandatory" to **'Strongly Recommended, but not Required,'** effective immediately. Council will continue to monitor the COVID risks in Ashtabula County and could change the policy as needed. Clean, new masks will still be available in the narthex free of charge.

Vacation Bible School

After a two-year suspension of VBS due to the COVID pandemic, we will partner again with Corpus Christi to offer VBS this year. Pastor Josh has been meeting with our staff and that of Corpus Christi. The dates are July 25th-29th. Good Shepherd will be the host. More details will be forthcoming as the plans develop.

Flower Gardeners Needed

Depending upon the weather, we will begin preparing and planting our flower gardens sometime around the week of May 22nd. We could use your help for 1 or 2 half days of planting, fertilizing, and mulching. You don't have to commit to all of the work, just whatever you are comfortable with. Scholarships

The deadline for mailing a completed higher education scholarship application to the church office is Friday, May 27th. All applications must be mailed and any postmarked after the 27th will not be accepted. There are several qualifying requirements. The top three are, 1) you must be a member of Good Shepherd for at least 2 years; 2) you must have attended our worship services at least 24 times in each of your 11th and 12th grades; and 3) your high school (grades 9-12) grade point average (GPA) must be a minimum of 2.8. If your senior year GPA is not yet available, the approval of your application will be subject to receipt of the school transcript.

Lutheran Disaster Response Fund- Ukraine

The people of Ukraine have been viscously and mercilessly attacked by the Russian armed forces since February 24th. Thousands of Ukrainian civilians and military personnel have been killed and many cities and towns are in ruins. Nearly 5 million refugees have fled Ukraine to neighboring countries. This crisis has strained the ability of the accepting countries to give aid to so many people. One of the agencies that has swung into action is the **Lutheran Disaster Response** team. It is providing food, water, blankets, and hygiene kits to the refugees in Ukraine, Poland, Hungary, Romania, and Slovakia. Pastor Josh made an appeal to our congregation to support the Lutheran Disaster **Response** for humanitarian reasons and because 100% of our contributions will go directly to its **Eastern Europe Crisis Response**. As of this writing, a little over \$1,100 has been donated by our members plus the Nisua Team has added another \$1,000 from its bread sales. Thank you for opening your hearts to helping the people of Ukraine.

ELCA Fund for Leaders

To become a Lutheran minister requires a four-year bachelor degree plus four additional years in a Lutheran seminary. Many potential future pastors are probably dissuaded from entering the ministry because they simply can't afford all the schooling. And many of the seminary graduates have tens of thousands of dollars of student loans that they will struggle to payoff. The high cost of becoming a minister has, no doubt, contributed to the shortage of seminary students. There is financial aid help, though, through the **ELCA Fund for Leaders.**The ELCA Fund for Leaders scholarship program supports students of tremendous promise attending ELCA seminaries. By making seminary more affordable, the ELCA Fund for Leaders enables more future ministers to go to seminary and helps them graduate with less debt, empowering those whom God calls into ministry to go and serve as the church needs and the Holy Spirit leads.

To help support this cause, church council unanimously approved a \$500 donation to this fund. The cash will come from our Mission and Education Endowment Fund. If you want to make a personal donation to this fund, please see Pastor Josh.

Update: We served 697 lunches and dinners over this past month. We also served 28 families in our food pantry. We are in the process of moving the Food Pantry to a larger room. This is a blessing for us. We will have more room to serve our community.

A big thank you to all that made breakfast casseroles and the yummy muffins and bread for the Easter breakfast. We served about 30, including a visitor. She was glad to worship with us and was so grateful for all the hospitality that we showed her and others. Maybe she was an angel.
