From the thoughts of the pastor . . .

CORRECTION: Please be advised I was incorrect in my June article of the ECHO regarding the "Rent-to-Own" situation of the past. I have been corrected as the following is what happened (or at least the very closest to what happened):

Years ago, the church (or one of previous churches) owned a parsonage. GSLC then sold that parsonage with some intent to use proceeds from that sale to loan to the pastor – at a very low rate – funds for a down payment of a house. This was done three times with two of the three paying back the loan (and small interest) in full. The third, however, did not and sold the home purchased, and left the community and the church, without full payment of loan back to the church.

The church DID NOT purchase a house for the pastor to live with a "Rent-to-Own" agreement in place and I was mistaken and apologize.

And while I am doing a mea culpa, I want to take an opportunity to apologize for offences I have committed in person, in writing, or social media posts. The last thing I want to do is cause division that is unnecessary, or post things that are offensive to people – specifically around language. I am sorry and I humbly repent and ask for forgiveness. I am human, I make mistakes, I sin and I have been made aware of my sin and need to acknowledge my sin.

My calling as a pastor is to not make division, but put voice to division that exists in the subtext. I mentioned in last month's ECHO about being transparent, something I endeavor to be continuously, and I want this stated without subtext or inference: there is division, serious and, I would say, harmful division in the church council. I know we don't like our dirty laundry aired but you as the congregation need to know this. And this division is surrounded by differences in church ideologies, financial ideologies, and governance ideologies. The division has come out regarding the status and ownership of rental properties.

As pastors, we look for the quiet voices, the voices that are not being heard, the voices that don't want to make waves and we speak for those voices. Good pastors trying to get all voices heard end up creating division because the loud voices start to lose their dominance as new voices come in. In the past, other pastors might have been "good" because they maintained the status quo. But they were reluctant to face issues in the congregation and kicking the bucket of division into the future. It is very, very easy to maintain the status quo and kick problems into the future. But the downside of this is two-fold: 1) decline in attendance leading to church closure; 2) making things more difficult for future generations (if in existence) and future pastors. Dealing with things here and now, while the opportunity exists, is the best course of action – even if it causes division.

There's a small fact many pastors won't acknowledge or admit but a fact nonetheless. Church attendance declines in the first few years of a pastorship. The changing of the guard, if you will, is a change to something different and some people are just not willing to change along with the guard. Unfortunately,

sometimes, those who leave are some of the oldest (not in age but longevity) members who leave. I have seen this in the congregation in Santa Fe when the current pastor was called there. My parents decided to attend separate churches (one continues at the church the other attending a different church), people I knew growing up for 30+ years going there, people who I would never have though would leave all have left because of the change in guard, not because the pastor there is a bad fit or a bad pastor, but couldn't adapt or unwilling to adapt to the change in guard. I think, also and unfortunately, here at Good Shepherd, the COVID pandemic gave an excuse to leave (or not return) leading to an extra decrease in attendance.

I don't mention this fact to encourage anyone to leave – I truly and absolutely hope everyone will stay. I mention this fact as a transparency to the life of a church during transition (and yes, we are still transitioning). As such, in this time of transition, we have a red hot iron ready for striking to allow all voices heard even if this causes division. My theme for the first year – and in all honesty still is to this day – is "because we've always done it isn't a reason".

Because we've always done it isn't a reason to do anything. Many of us have driven for a long time, to the point of saying, "I've always driven". But sometimes we need our license and car taken away for the safety and wellbeing of ourselves and others. Some of us have lived on our own for a long time, to the point of saying, "I've always lived alone". But sometimes we need to be entered into an assisted care facility for our wellbeing or the wellbeing of those we love. Because we've always done it isn't a reason to do anything; we have to look at our wellbeing and the wellbeing of those around us.

I am still learning how to be a pastor and, hopefully, a good pastor. And I am still learning how to be your pastor. I come with new ideologies, fresh seminary training, and a commitment to Good Shepherd. What I hope to learn and hope to teach is the openness to something different, a change of the "we've always done it", and a philosophy of striking the iron while it's hot. We strike the iron now to forge for the future and the future of this church.

Parsonage The residence of the clergyperson who serves a local congregation. It is usually owned by the church. Also called a "manse [, clergy house, prior, rectory, parish house, etc]."¹

Manse (Lat. *Manere*, "to dwell") A house owned by a church to be used as the residence of the pastor or minister.²

I decided to take a break this month from the vestment definitions and define for you some of the words that were used in this month's ECHO Article from the pastor. Before I begin, though, I want to make clear I am not advocating for anything, rather a clarification of terms that are often used in the church world that maybe not everyone knows what they mean. (This is the reason for this section of the ECHO.)

Each denomination within the Christian church has its own policy regarding a *parsonage*. But before going into that, let's look historically. Parsonages were houses that were usually close to, if not on the same grounds, as the church building. Prior to parsonages, clergy would have a private or semi-private room within the church building. (To go back further would mean talking about monasteries and the lack of local churches.) Martin Luther, when sent to Wittenberg prior to the reformation, had a private room within the church building, then a house after his marriage to Katharina Von Bora. Luther didn't start the practice of parsonages, just some context of his living situation as a pastor; parsonages, as we know them, began more in the 12th century.

Prior to the 12th century, most churches were started by wealthy patrons and the clergy wasn't really thought of highly, only necessary, so they would house the clergy in the church somewhere. But around the 12th century, and to show the lords of the lands benevolence, a separate house was built, usually on the church grounds if possible, for the clergy. These houses varied in construction and the old ones, that exist today, were usually the ones built the strongest and most luxurious, as clergy started to have a standard of living comparable with the lords. As the centuries past, the housing for the clergy developed to be more in line with the housing of the communities until we get to today where a parsonage is no different than an ordinary house with some continue to be on the same grounds as the church and others miles away.

More and more these days, denominations are going to a "housing allowance" form of housing practice to allow the clergy to get a home that fits them as a parsonage might not fit their needs or desires. Some, though, do provide a parsonage and the clergy must, then, chose to live in that parsonage or not with the consequences that come from that decision. It is a decision for the congregation/parish to make. Usually, and I really am stretching the term of usually, usually the Roman Catholic Church has a parsonage that the clergy lives in, same with the United Methodist



Church. Rural and/or conservative ELCA Lutherans still have parsonages where urban and/or progressive ELCA Lutherans do not. It does really depend on the location of the church and the housing availability near the church that can determine a parsonage or not.

But, as I mentioned, more and more congregations/parishes are going to the "housing allowance" system like we have here at Good Shepherd. And this makes sense, though I might be a little bias, as more and more clergy desire a home that suits their needs and desires, and allows a little separation (boundaries) between congregation and clergy – which is healthy.

Since parsonages are church property, they are maintained by the church property committee, they are fully owned by the church as not allowing the clergy the ability to have as much equity as their own home would, and it makes for awkward dynamic between congregation and clergy.

As I stated, I am not suggesting anything, advocating for anything, or any desire for anything; all I want to do was to define a word used in the church for clarity.
