From the thoughts of the pastor ...

We have been talking about the Seven Deadly Sins in the last few articles, and we will continue that discussion/lesson. But I feel this December article should be focused on the Church Seasons that happen in December – Advent and Christmas.

This year, we begin our season of Advent on December 1^{st} – a somewhat rarity. Our Advent calendars – whether chocolate or scripture – get to follow the church calendar. I know this doesn't sound super great, and – in all reality – it isn't, but just a nice thing for once as we can prepare ourselves, our homes, and our church for the coming Christ Child; that is, after all, what Advent is all about.

Advent is traditionally seen as a time of waiting and preparing for the celebration of Jesus' birth on Christmas Day (yes, Christmas Day not Christmas Eve). But Advent is also the period we are in now as we are waiting and preparing for the celebration of the second coming of Christ, the Messiah, the Emmanuel (God with us). As we prepare ourselves, we take stock of our lives – the where we've done wrong or could have done better; the what we left undone and wish we could have done. This sounds a lot like repentance or confession – a lot like Lent, if you will – and it is, it is a lot of repentance and confession; Advent is a mini-Lent, a mini time of repentance and reflection prior to the great celebration of Christ. But what, exactly, are we preparing, and what are we preparing for?

To answer the first question, we prepare ourselves, which we just discussed, and we prepare our homes and worship spaces, the places where we live and feel the most comfortable, the places where we want Jesus to feel welcomed, the places we feel we can honor Jesus the most. We want Jesus to enter our homes, our worship space, our lives, our hearts without any doubts or darkness or fear to allow Jesus to take and make a home in and around us. It is no surprise, then, that Advent begins the new Church Year as we - like we do for our other calendars - make new year resolutions to worship more, follow Christ more, and follow the greatest commandments to Love God and Love Neighbor more. This might mean letting go of the last year and

focusing on the could be - focus on the potential rather than regret of the past. This could be deciding to focus on God and your own spiritual health and well-being rather than holding on to grudges and pride. This could be focusing on "the other" rather than "the self" or "the one" putting the good of others and the community ahead of self...ahead of one. What a new year resolution means to you is for you; take this time of Advent to prepare yourselves to receive Christ in your heart, mind, body, soul; to receive Christ in your life to Love God and to Love Neighbor.

This now leads to the second question: what are we preparing This question is more for? theological as well as physical. Physically, we are making preparations - greening the church, cleaning the church, setting everything up in place for the Christmas season and the Christmas worship service. We are physically preparing for the Incarnation at Bethlehem (the birth of God on earth). Theologically, though, we prepare for Christ's presence in the sacrament of the Eucharist. Moreover, on this point, we

believe in the real presence of Christ in, under, and around the bread and wine (or grape juice) of the Holy Communion Meal (the Eucharist). But we believe in the perpetual presence of Christ in the elements and within us when we consume the elements. (Hence the reverence of the elements after service and the proper disposal of the elements.) It then can be said we only need Holy Communion once in our lifetime for Christ to be within us, around us, and under us. But a word of caution here, Christ is only within, around, and under us when we let Christ be within, around, and under us - which we, as humans, fail more than we Thus, it is good and know. proper to celebrate Holy Communion when we meet to have more chances for Christ perpetual presence within, around, and under us all the time.

Finally, the last theological idea we prepare for during this season of Advent is the second coming of Christ and the Final Judgement. We believe, and confess during the creeds, that Jesus will come again to judge the living and the dead. Now, our Lutheran belief tells us that we have been judged and our judgement has been atoned for through the sacrifice of Christ on the cross. But that does not negate the need to prepare for this judgement – which we do by letting Christ within our hearts, mind, body, and soul.

And after all this preparation, after all the reflection and repentance and confession, after our houses and churches are decorated and our heart and mind and soul are ready for Christ, we get the most precious gift ever given to the world – God incarnate through this little baby Jesus.

This is the significance of Christmas, that God has entered the world to take on the form of human to be like us. Recently, at least in my mind/scholarly world, the focus has been more on the date of Christmas rather than the meaning of Christmas. But it doesn't matter if Christ was born December 25th or September 9th, or March 22nd, or whatever. (Truth be told, Christ is born -God is born and with us – every day and especially the days we are baptized or confirmed or came back to faith or need God What matters or...or...or...) about Christmas is the idea that we celebrate God entering the world in human form, to live the life of humanity, and eventually

to die and raise again for us and the world. Christmas is the first chapter of the story, not the end of the story or the middle of the story, and Easter (the Resurrection of Christ) is another chapter of the story, not the end of the story. Christmas and Easter are intertied together to show that God loves the world, that God became human became incarnate – became one of us. The song, One of us is the reality and trueness of Christmas asking "What if God was one of us?; God became "a slob like one of us, a stranger on the bus".¹ The celebration of Christmas is the celebration this happened, is happening, and will happen again.

These seasons that happen in December and continue to Epiphany in January give us a chance to prepare ourselves – heart, mind, body, soul – for Christ to enter and come within and also to celebrate that Christ is born again – that God is incarnated again – to be with us, for us, and with us now and forever.

Advent Wreath A wreath made with pine branches or other materials with four candles that are lit during the four weeks of the Advent season. A center or Christ candle is lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day. A short ceremony is often used for the lighting of the candles in churches or homes.²

The Advent Wreath is something rather special in the church. It's a piece of equipment that is used so rarely but is also so important that it takes a prominent place in the worship space and worship service. At Good Shepherd, the current Advent Wreath sits on the stand that holds the Christ Candle (or Pascal Candle) making this wreath the focal point of the light of Christ. Any baptisms or funerals or weddings that make the necessary use of the Christ Candle get lit off the Advent Wreath instead. This can also be seen as a physical sign of Christ coming again when we return the Christ Candle to its stand during the season of light (Epiphany).

However, this idea is not in all churches. In Christ Lutheran

Church in Santa Fe, the Advent Wreath is hung – suspended on a rope - with just the four Advent Candles. At home granted not a church – four candles are in a window in a line. Your practice might be different and practices around the world that celebrate Advent and use an Advent Wreath are different, but the concept and meaning is the same - to symbolize the passage of the four weeks of Advent in preparation of And yet, some Christmas. questions remain - or at least happen – which we can answer now – as long as the meaning of the Advent Candles are not lost: why a wreath, why evergreens, why candles, and when did this practice start?

Traditionally, Advent Wreaths are round – wreath shaped – to symbolize the infinity of God's love; there is no beginning and – more importantly – no end to God's love. A circle or round wreath gives us the representation that God loves us and will continue to love us always. A traditional Advent Wreath uses greens – evergreens – from pine trees or other evergreen trees to represent the hope of eternal life brought by Jesus Christ. This is the same reason we use evergreen trees as Christmas Trees – and why green is a primary color of Christmas – to symbolize and represent the eternal life given to us through Jesus Christ.

The candles are used to represent the light of God that is coming into this world in the infant baby Jesus. Each week, a different candle is lit to represent one attribute of this baby Jesus: hope, peace, joy, and love. Most Christian denominations use three or four blue or purple candles (the color of the liturgical season), but the Anglican Church in the United Kingdom has a more common tradition to use four red candles and these linked to the coming of Christ in: the hope of all God's people, the Old Testament Prophets, John the Baptist, and Mary the mother of Jesus, each linked with the Sunday Revised Common Lectionary reading for Advent (the readings, I'll add, that we read during worship service as well). Finally, in the Eastern Christian Church. the wreath consists of six candles, differently colored, to celebrate

the six weeks of the 40-day Advent/Christmas period. The candles are (in order): green candle – symbolizing faith; blue candle – symbolizing hope; gold candle – symbolizing love; white candle – symbolizing peace; purple candle – symbolizing repentance; and red candle – symbolizing communion. It is traditional in these wreaths to not include the Christ Candle in the center.

Now, we know the symbols behind the wreath, where did it come from? Well, just like lights on the Christmas tree, the tradition started in 16th century Germany with the German Lutherans; however, it might not have looked like the wreaths we see today, the modern Advent wreaths. Apparently, a Lutheran pastor in Germany - Johann Hinrich Wichern (1808-1881) – is credited with the "invention" of the modern Advent wreath. Legend has it, he taught children at a mission school in Hamburg where the kids would daily ask if Christmas had come. (Side note: remember, a calendar (like we have) in the home or school was extremely rare. Important dates were linked to religious holidays, so the church told people when it was.) Getting tired from the kids constantly asking if Christmas had come, Pastor Wichern took a large wooden ring and decorated it with 24 small red candles and four large white candles. Each day, Pastor Wichern lit a small red candle and every Sunday he lit a large white candle. Protestants around Germany began to

follow suit and in the early 1920s, the Roman Catholic Church adopted this custom. The Advent Calendar was created, and the modern Advent Wreath was trimmed down mostly due to the dropping of daily worship services - to the four candles we have today. It should be noted that an Advent Wreath (aka Advent Crown) is not the same thing, and holds no connection to, the crown of candles of St. Lucy - the celebration of St. Lucy on December 13th, where traditionally a crown (or wreath) with candles is worn on the head of a young girl.

Thus, Lutheran do have a substantial claim to fame for any and all churches who practice worship with an Advent Wreath.


