From the thoughts of the pastor...

Christos Anesti ("Χριστὸς ἀνέστη")

The last couple of months, my whole mind and even my whole being stopped at Easter Sunday; like I could not think of things past Easter – no appointments, no meetings, nothing about my life or the church beyond Easter Sunday. It's difficult to explain but it's like my whole life stops at Easter, which is ironic because Easter is all about new birth, new life, resurrection and all that jazz.

We celebrate Easter because it is the point in our faith where our faith really begins. We've never seen, nor heard of (scholarly historical accounts) of any person rising from the dead, being resurrected. There isn't any proof, evidence, tangible facts that tell us Jesus (or anyone) rose from the dead. It's by faith that we believe this; it's by faith we believe in life after death. This is the heart of the Christian faith to believe that Jesus rose from the dead – not just spiritually, but physically. We don't see that in today's world; our dearly beloved who have died are not physically with us again. And if we do, it has become more of a zombie-type fear that has been propagated within society – hence the inappropriate moniker "Zombie Jesus Day" for Easter.

But to invoke Shakespeare, what's in a name? Should we really care whether we call it Easter Sunday, Resurrection of our Lord, Easter Day, or Zombie Jesus Day? I would say, no, it doesn't matter what the day, the celebration, is called. And, if Zombie Jesus Day is something that makes you think about what happened this day, all the better. Like "a rose by any other name [still] smells as sweet" (Shakespeare, W. *Romeo and Juliet*, Act 2, Scene 2), the reason for the day is what matters. Jesus is victorious over death.

There are many "theories" and "explanations" – almost one for every theologian (ordained or lay leader or biblical scholar) – that tries to deal with the question, "what happens when we die" and "what does it mean that Jesus is victorious over death." The truth of the matter is, we don't know, but we have certain beliefs that might help with these questions. Let's begin with the second question, "what does it mean that Jesus is victorious over death."

To answer this, we need to back up a little bit to Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians where he writes, "So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. *It is sown a physical body, there is also a spiritual body*" (1 Cor. 15:42-44, NRSV, emphasis added). Paul talks about, in several places but most specifically here, having two bodies – the physical and the spiritual. When we talk about Jesus' victory over death, we talk about the death of the spiritual body. Now the question arises about death of a spiritual body.

The answer to this is quite simple, being separated from God. Like our physical bodies need good nutrition, exercise, rest, and so forth, our spiritual bodies need the same, otherwise they will decay and die.

Good nutrition for our spiritual bodies is doing something good for others, worshipping God, prayer, things that would "feed the soul" (soul being another word for spiritual body). Exercise is the same my practicing your faith, even testing it from time to time; like a muscle in the physical body during weight-lifting tests the strength of the muscle, testing your spiritual body through faith testing tests the strength of the spiritual muscle. And rest, the time to recharge your spiritual body through worship services and other practices – perhaps outdoor activities, time with family, and so on. When we fail to "eat right, exercise, and get plenty of rest" our spiritual bodies decay and wither until it dies – until we are separated from God. Hell/death is the ultimate separation from God.

But we say Jesus has been victorious over death, how can death (or Hell) exist? Let's answer the question with a question: the 13 colonies were victorious over England, how can England exist? Same principle. And this leads us to the question: what happens when we die? Or more aptly, what happens when we physically die and when we spiritually die?

When we physically die, our physical bodies start decomposing almost immediately. Without the heart pumping blood and oxygen around the body, the body becomes acidic which starts breaking down the tissues. As the tissues are being broken down, gases are produced (which eventually leak out causing a terrible stench) and insects are attracted which begin to speed the decomposition of the body. Eventually the body liquefies leaving the bones and teeth remaining.<sup>1</sup> (This is, of course, without the uses of a funeral home for embalming – which delays the processes – or cremation – which burns the body completely). But our physical body death does not equal the spiritual body death.

(I'll caveat this section as my personal belief, and what I teach.) When the physical body dies, the spiritual body continues – out of time, space, and science. Maybe it moves to another dimension, maybe it moves to a higher plane, maybe it's transformed into pure energy; what matters is it continues and then put into another physical body – if one chooses. I don't believe in the pearly gates or Peter with the list or clouds and all that has been depicted in art, cartoons, and other media. I don't think we have the words to describe "heaven" only as a place of pure bliss. I believe our spiritual bodies have a choice to either stay in this pure bliss or return to earth as anyone in history or anyone in the future or some random person. For example, we might return to earth as a great historical figure like George Washington or Abraham Lincoln. The point is we get to choose what we do next and the spiritual body lives on.

Now we get to the question: if the spiritual body lives on, how can we spiritually die? Unfortunately, the answer to this is quite simple, by not believing in God (or higher power or any other name for God). When we choose to stop believing, we spiritually die.

But, because Jesus is victorious over death, we can return to God – believe in God – and our spiritual bodies are alive again. It might not seem fair, it might not seem right, it might seem as an easy out to do bad things in the world and then at the last minute believe in God, but remember, belief is more than just saying the creed or going to worship services; belief is deep within us, at our very core, our very conscience which helps us make decisions in this world. The victory of Jesus over death allows us to make mistakes – go against our conscience and our core – and not be eternally separated from God when we ask God for forgiveness, which, again, needs to come from our very core.


So, yes, my mind is focused on Easter Sunday, but all of our minds should always be focused on Easter Sunday. It is the day where we are granted the greatest gift ever to be granted, life. When our physical bodies die, our spiritual bodies live on because of the victory of Jesus over death. Like our physical

bodies, we need to take care of our spiritual bodies by feeding it right and good things, exercising it with prayer and faith trials, and making sure it is rested and recharged each week during worship services. The life we've been granted by Jesus' resurrection gives us the chance to live a physical life to the fullest – even if we make mistakes. Whether you call it Easter Sunday, Resurrection of our Lord, Easter Day, or Zombie Jesus Day, remember the life you have been granted by the resurrection of Jesus and live that life.



Have you seen these things around in the world?

#### ECHO Word May 2025

We'll pick-up the candle words in June as there's a word I've been using and thinking about more often.

**Adiaphora** (Gr. "things indifferent") Elements of faith regarded as neither commanded nor forbidden in Scripture and thus on which liberty of conscience may be exercised (see Rom. 14:17; 1 Cor. 6:12; 8:8; Gal. 5:6). An adiaphoristic controversy in relation to the Augsburg Interim (1548) led to art. 10 [Article 10] of the Formula of Concord (1577).<sup>2</sup>

In simple terms, adiaphora means it doesn't really matter (at least for justification or salvation). Some simple examples, to alb or not to alb is adiaphoric, grape juice or wine, standing or sitting, chanting or speaking, organ or electric piano – all these are not questions to be dealing with when speaking about what is needed for justification or salvation. Faith in God/Christ is NOT adiaphoric for justification. A lot of the disagreements between denominations are indeed adiaphoric. I might mean a whole lot to one person or one denomination, but it won't stand in the way of praising God together or even sharing the meal with one another.

I've mentioned the greatest division between the Roman Catholic Church and the Evangelical Lutheran Church is the theology of the Lord's Supper/Holy Communion/the Eucharist. It is the change in substance verses the change in essence. This difference, to some people – including those like me who wish to be Ecumenical – is adiaphoric and at the same time is not because the holy meal does matter. What we struggle with – in our personal soul searching and reflections – is whether the holy meal is a requirement for justification and/or salvation. I say it's not because if you have faith, you are granted grace and Holy Communion is the physical manifestation of that grace. I say this because I'm Lutheran, where I believe the Catholic faith is different.

But whether we use oil candles or wax candles, baptismal font in the front or the rear of the sanctuary, crucifix or empty cross, all these do not matter for justification or salvation...as long as it does not distract from worshipping God. After all, the only thing that does matter and is not adiaphora is worshipping God.


