From the thoughts of the pastor...

Over the last few months, we have learned how scripture has progressed through the centuries as well as some authorship clarified – or not so clarified – especially in the New Testament. However, the only books of the Bible that we discussed, were the books included in the *Protestant* Bible...the *Roman Catholic, Slavonic, and Greek* Bible has a few more books, which we – and scholars – commonly call the Apocrypha or, more aptly, the Old Testament Apocrypha.

All the Apocrypha following churches (Roman Catholic, Slavonic, and Greek) include: Tobit, Judith, Additions to the Book of Esther, Wisdom of Solomon, Ecclesiasticus (aka Wisdom of Jesus, Son of Sirach), Baruch, The Letter of Jeremiah (Baruch Ch. 6), additions to the Greek version of Daniel, and 1&2 Maccabees. The Greek and Slavonic bibles also include: 1 Esdras (2 Esdras in Slavonic, 3 Esdras in Appendix to the Vulgate (first Latin translation of the bible)), Prayer of Manasseh, Psalm 151, and 3 Maccabees. The Slavonic bibles further include: 2 Esdras (4 Esdras in the Vulgate Appendix); while the Greek bibles include: 4 Maccabees.

As you can see, there are far more books of the bible than the 66 in the *Protestant* Bibles – our bibles. And these are only the ones included in bibles at all; there are dozens – if not hundreds – of "scriptures" not included in the bible from both the Old and New Testament times. Some New Testament books that are not present in any bible are: Epistle of Barnabas, Shepherd of Hermas, Acts of Paul, Gospel of Peter, Apocalypse of Peter, Didache, 1 Clement, and The Gospel According to Hebrews. Finally (or at least finally for our purposes), we have the so-called Gnostic Texts which include: the Gospel of Thomas, the Gospel of Mary, the Gospel of Philip, the Gospel of Truth, the Gospel of Judas, the Apocryphon of John, the Hypostasis of Archons, and the Sophia of Jesus Christ.

So, we must ask ourselves this question: why were some scriptures cleared and some scriptures rejected?

The primary answer comes down to usage. In the centuries following the resurrection and ascension of Christ, many books were written...but not all were used widely within the Christian community. The books that we have in our *Protestant* Bibles (the Old Testament – Hebrew Scriptures – the Letters of Paul, the other letters, and the gospels) were the books that were widely used, that were most commonly used. While other books – like the Gnostic Texts – were used in some areas, they weren't used very commonly.

Now legion (and misrepresented history) says the competing books of the canon were placed on the altar at the Council of Nicaea and the ones that fell off were rejected from the canon. This is a fictitious anecdote that was popularized by Voltaire (a French philosopher and writer who was known for his criticism of Christianity in the early 1700s). There are no records or any other historical facts to back up this claim by Voltaire.

Another misunderstanding in history is the Council of Nicaea determined the biblical canon. Again, Voltaire also popularized this story as there are no records of the biblical canon even being discussed at the Council of Nicaea. For the most part, the canon was nearly complete and set. It was Emperor Constantine who, in 331 CE (6 years after the Council of Nicaea), commissioned bibles to be produced which was the catalyst to set the canon officially.

Most scholars believe the biblical canon was finally closed (set without changes) during the Council of Rome in 382 CE. When Martin Luther created the first German-language bible in 1534 CE, he included the Apocrypha but as a separate section after the Old Testament but before the New Testament (which is where the Apocrypha is located today). However, the books of the Apocrypha were not listed in the table of contents as Luther thought these were good books to read but not equal to scripture.

The bible considered to be the first English bible was the Tyndale Bible but only included the Pentateuch and the Book of Jonah. The bible considered to be the first complete English translation was the Coverdale Bible of 1535, which, like Luther's German Bible, placed the Apocrypha in a separate section. The infamous King James Version was produced in 1611 using some of Tyndale's' work as well as Coverdale's work. The bible translation used at Good Shepherd under Pastor Krenz is the New Revised Standard Version created in 1989. A minor update was made recently which has turned the NRSV to the NRSVue (New Revised Standard Version Updated Edition).

Our biblical journey has come to a conclusion but that doesn't mean it ends. Today, modern scholars are using newly found manuscripts, new ideas in translations, new understandings of the times our stories take place to give us a better understanding of the message God wants us to hear.

Our personal biblical paths are going to be different; no one person says that a certain scripture means a certain thing. Reading the bible, immersing yourselves in the bible, is a lifelong process towards understanding. Even scholars who have studied the bible their whole lives find new meaning, new interpretations, new ideas from these ancient texts. I guess that is why it is the greatest story ever told and the best-selling book for centuries.

**Missal/missalette** (Lat. *Missalis*, from *missa*, "mass") Book containing what is sung, chanted, or recited in the Roman Catholic Mass. The Sunday Missal provided materials for Sunday and holy days. The Daily Missal provides materials for every day of the year.<sup>1</sup>

In essence, the missal is a big hymnal with a few exceptions: there are no hymns in the missal, and everything is printed fully. At Good Shepherd, we don't use the missal too much except for the seasons where Pastor Krenz decides to stay within a single setting. But we do have a missal from both the Lutheran Book of Worship (the green hymnals in the pews) and the Evangelical Lutheran Worship book. When Pastor Krenz does decide to use the missal, he prefers the ELW missal as this is the current hymnal for the ELCA.

## But why these at all?

Prior to the use of bulletins that include the whole service, churches would print little sheets that have page numbers and hymn numbers on them with the congregation expected to use the hymnals in the pews. Good Shepherd did this for a long time – it is the more traditional worship style. And since the pew hymnals do not include everything for all settings, the missal was used as the leaders guide. But we've gone away from using hymnals in the worship service because: a) hymnals can be cumbersome books to hold; b) visitors to a church might have a hard time following the service within the hymnal; c) cost of new hymnals vs cost of printing is great; and d) it limits the worship services to a singular style which doesn't allow for any new settings or new resources to be used.

We have been introducing new music – familiar tunes with new words – that have come out of the new hymnal supplement All Creation Sings, and we are looking at using these new settings. If we stayed only within the capabilities of the missal, both you and I would get bored and perhaps not wish to participate in worship services as much.

We won't get rid of the hymnals or the missals as we will continue to use them. What we might consider is when Pastor Krenz decides to stay within a single setting, we can put the page number and hymn number in the bulletin for those who would like to use the hymnal for that traditional worship service style.




